The Italian environmental policy

1. At the supranational level

- Italy's environmental policies have been largely shaped within the framework of the EU, though in some cases, Italian environmental policy anticipated EU requirements.
- Multilateral environmental agreements have also influenced policy and legal developments.
- The European Union acquis communautaire provided unifying guidance for strengthening Italy's environmental legislation, thus bringing the Italian environmental regulations closer to EU requirements.
- The transposition of EU Directives has often been late and has not resulted in a coherent and comprehensive body of environmental legislation.



2. At the national level: the key - players

- ❖ Since 1986 the Ministry of the Environment, Land and Sea (IMELS / MATTM) is the main governmental body in charge of:
- regulations
- co-ordination and control.
- ❖ During the last decade, economic growth in Italy has been experiencing the most severe recession of the last half century. Weak growth has reduced many environmental pressures.
- ❖ MATTM annual budget was heavily decreased, despite its responsibilities have been extended over the years (in 2006 the protection of marine waters).
- ❖ MATTM is supported by highly specialised actors, including:
- the Department of the Marine Environment of Harbours and Coast Guard;
- the Carabinieri Corps for environmental protection, an environmental unit of the national military police at the disposal of MATTM;
- the State Forestry Corps (Corpo Forestale dello Stato), an autonomous unit of the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Forestry and
- ISPRA.



3. At the sub national level.

- Regions and lower level of administration important role in environmental policy development.
- Many environment-related plans, such as land use, air quality and waste management as well as energy and transport, were developed by the regions.
- In some cases such initiatives preceded the requirements set at the national level and anticipated the developments adopted at the EU level.
- Several initiatives are launched by municipalities, responsible for the local environment. They include air pollution, water and waste services or green areas management. City-oriented solutions, such as the efforts of Rome or Milan metropolitan areas to reduce urban traffic, may help to address acute environmental problems.
- Key role of regional and local administrations in environmental management.
- they issue permits that adapt, in a regional context, objectives determined through national legislation; monitor environmental performance; also define priorities for environmental action; introduce specific policy instruments, carry out investment programmes and respond to no-compliance.



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The "National System" ISPRA – ARPA - APPA rection and Research

- An elaborate system of regional environmental agencies which comprises ISPRA (co-ordinator) and all ARPAs/APPAs, supports sub-national administrations.
- It includes 19 Regional Environmental Protection Agencies (ARPAs) and two provincial agencies for the Autonomous Provinces of Trento and Bolzano (APPAs).
- The System fosters and promotes implementation of national objectives at the regional level and the development of harmonised methodological and operational guidance



ISPRA Legal Profile

- ISPRA is a public research body with technical, scientific, organizational, managerial, administrative and financial autonomy under the vigilance of the Ministry of the Environment, Land and Sea, (IMELS) which provides ISPRA with general guidelines and priorities for the pursuit of its institutional responsibilities
- 2014 / consolidated budget: € 109,5 mln; financial contribution from IMELS € 85,2 mln;
- 2014 / permanent staff employed: 1182 other staff: 149



ISPRA Key Task and Responsibilities

- ISPRA is going to be reshaped according to the newly issued Statute.
- With reference to the protection of waters, air, soil, subsoil, marine and terrestrial biodiversity, ISPRA fields of activities are:
 - A) research and experimentation
 - B) Cognitive, control, monitoring and evaluation activities
 - C) strategic consulting and technical-scientific assistance to the Ministry of the Environment D) information dissemination, education and training, including post-graduate education



Organisation: Bodies of ISPRA

- President (strategic coordination of institutional and international relations; coordination, monitoring and evaluation of research).
- Board of Directors (planning and programming of the activities)
- Board of Auditors (the controlling body)
- Scientific Council
- Independent Body for the Performance Evaluation
- Director General (ISPRA general management; implementation of Board of Directors' resolutions; information, communication; data harmonization and reporting; Office for Relations with the Public).



ISPRA Structure

- Technical Scientific Structure, including:
 - A) Department for environmental evaluation, monitoring and sustainability;
 - B) Department for the Geological Survey of Italy
 - C) Department for environment monitoring and protection and for the conservation of biodiversity
 - D) National Center for Nuclear Safety and Radiation Protection.
- Administrative and Managerial Structure, including:
 - E) Department for Human Resources and General Affairs
