Indicators linked to tangible, preferably legally binding, targets significantly increase the likelihood of action. Additionally, indicators that are widely recognized and shared across sectors strengthen interdisciplinary collaboration and commitment. Our goal is to explore how indicators can help us go beyond tracking symptoms of ecological decline, toward shaping new paradigms, building cross-sectoral partnerships, and empowering behavioural and structural change. • Short update by the European Commission Framing questions for discussion: 1) Which types of indicators help enable new conversations with actors (including other government ministries) outside the nature policy domain - such as finance, energy, health, or agriculture - to align their strategies with transformative change	Rayka Hauser (Unit Natural Capital and Ecosystem Health, DG ENV, European Commission)

	 3) Which types of indicators are most effective at inspiring public awareness and behavioural change—e.g. those that link nature to daily life, equity, and well-being? 4) How do we avoid the trap of "you manage what you measure," where indicators end up driving narrow action rather than holistic systems thinking? What strategies help balance measurability with complexity, ensuring system-wide impact? 5) How might EuropaBON's work on codeveloped, policy-aligned biodiversity monitoring (i.e. EBOCC) help us build a shared indicator framework that supports TCfN across Europe?
